



Auburn, Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute, July 19, 1939

Located on the Alabama Polytechnic campus of the fourteen new buildings and the first unit of an athletic stadium under construction in a \$1,500,000 Works Progress Administration (**WPA**) expansion is show in the above diagram. The new buildings include a new women's dormitories unit (present day Quad Center) and associated women's dorms), **\$560,000**; addition to Carnegie library building (present day Mary Martin Hall), **\$100,000**; general classroom building (present day Tichenor classroom building, **\$200,000**; veterinary classroom and student teaching laboratory building (present day Cary Hall), **\$150,000**; college infirmary and health center (former Drake Student Health Center – now demolished) \$100,000; farm engineering building (present day Corley Building) **\$100,000**; physical education building (Field House) (present day Petrie Hall), **\$100,000**; first unit of athletic stadium (present day Jordan Hare Stadium, **\$60,000**; nursery school building (present day Early Childhood Center) **\$19,250**; practice house for Home Economics students (present day Marriage and Family Counseling Center) \$19,250; and a new President's home, **\$38,400**. The home formerly used by President L.N. Duncan will be used as a social center for women students (present day Cater Hall) with the four dormitories and dining hall completing what will be known as the Women's Quadrangle.



Miss Baker is pictured being awarded the Certificate of Merit from the American Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in recognition of her space flight and "blazing the trail for human beings who will follow and widening the horizons of scientific knowledge, which will eventually benefit all of us who dwell on the earth, whether animals or human."

Miss Baker became III the night of Sunday, November 25, 1984 at Alabama's Space and Rocket Center and was sent to Auburn University's College of Veterinary Medicine for treatment. After showing signs of improvement Wednesday, Miss Baker's condition worsened and she passed away the next day, Nov. 29, 1984, at 10:10 a.m. CST of respiratory complications following acute kidney failure.

Miss Baker was 27 years old

-- the oldest known squirrel monkey in the world at that time.
